

Under the Building for Excellence appeal, a new \$4M science facility was proposed with a \$1.55M fundraising target. The appeal was \$300,000 short, but Council authorised construction due to competitive tender prices at the time. The building opened in April 1990.



A building for visual arts, design and technology was the highest priority. Council budgeted \$11M for this project. Foundation donated \$6M over ten years, and the rest was borrowed.

Headmaster Garth Wynne launched the first phase of the centenary appeal It's Your Turn with a target of \$200,000 per year for five years.



OBA donated the War Memorial sculpture.



1997

The School launched the Best Start in Life appeal with the aim of raising \$4M by 2000. By 2006 more than \$1.5M had been raised.
